# **Local Services for Business Support**

### **Free Services**

#### One-on-one business assistance.

- The Small Business Development Centers have Business Counselors on staff who can meet with you to answer your individual business questions, such as financial analysis, hiring, and marketing. The SBDC that is closest to Bowdoinham is Coastal Enterprises, Inc. (CEI) located in Wiscasset. Their address is 36 Water St., Wiscasset, ME 04578. Their phone number is 882-7552. Their website is <a href="www.ceimaine.org">www.ceimaine.org</a>. If you go to <a href="www.mainesbdc.org">www.mainesbdc.org</a>, you will see a list of the other locations. Usually, the SBDC counselors want you to have a draft business plan to show them before they offer you assistance. There are free workshops that can help you with this task. One example is Women, Work, and Community (they also serve men). Their website lists all the business classes that are being offered statewide including their center in Bath. <a href="www.womenworkandcommunity.org">www.womenworkandcommunity.org</a>.
- SCORE is a program of the Small Business Administration. They have a host of retired business professionals who are available to offer you both elementary and sophisticated business advice. It is helpful to let them know about your specific need so they can match you with a business counselor who can give you good guidance. There are 7 SCORE chapters in Maine. The Augusta chapter covers the mid-coast area. The phone number is 622-8509 and their website is www.augustame.score.org.
- For women, there are 2 organizations that are particularly designed to meet your needs.
  One is Women, Work, and Community. Their emphasis is on workshops and training, but
  one-on-one assistance is also available. Their local office in Bath is located at The Higher
  Education Center, 9 Park St., Bath ME 04530. Their phone number is 386-1224. Jenn
  Dobransky is the Microenterprise Coordinator for the area.
- The Women's Business Center is a part of Coastal Enterprises, Inc. (see above). They
  have several locations around the state. You can find more information about them at
  www.wbcmaine.org.

### **Workshops and Training**

- There are some excellent on-line workshops on a variety of business topics. You can
  access them through <a href="www.mainesbdc.org">www.mainesbdc.org</a>. On the left side of their home page is a tab
  where you can click and see the topics that are offered. It will guide you to a registration
  page. You can also get here through the WWC website by going to "Programs/Start a
  Business" and then scrolling down to the OYO (On Your Own) tab and clicking.
- Women, Work, and Community has an array of free workshops. They are offered at centers
  across the state including South Portland, Bath, Rockland, Augusta, and Lewiston, (for the
  more local locations). Go to their website at <a href="www.womenworkandcommunity.org">www.womenworkandcommunity.org</a>. You can
  click on "Programs/start a business" or "Training Schedule" to see the topics, times, and
  locations.
- The State of Maine sponsors a great site where all the various organizations post their workshops. Some of these are free and some of them have a fee. Groups such as Adult Education Programs, SBDC's, SCORE, WWC, CEI, etc. post what they are offering at this site. You can search by topic or by location. ### **Specific Assistance**

You may want to consider a student intern. If you have a specific need around developing a marketing campaign or getting help with business analysis, a student who is majoring in those

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topics may be able to help. UMA, for instance, is working closely with the town of Gardiner and other Kennebec towns to offer student intern help. This is just getting underway.

### Fee for Service

There are some wonderful professionals—many in Bowdoinham—who can offer specific business help with such things as marketing, branding, website development, bookkeeping and tax preparation. As professionals, they will charge for these services—usually an hourly rate. There may be a time in your business development when it is really important to get the expertise that a professional can offer.

### Money!!

- Maine Technology Institute. These grants are usually for technology-based businesses or for businesses that are using technology in a new way. You can check them out at www.mainetechnology.org.
- For farm based businesses that are doing value added food production, there are some Department of Agriculture grants. Check with the Maine Department of Agriculture for more information. (<a href="https://www.maine.gov/agriculture">www.maine.gov/agriculture</a>)
- Maine Arts Commission. For artists and artisans, there are some grant possibilities through MAC. Their website is <a href="https://www.maineart.maine.gov">www.maineart.maine.gov</a>.
- For individuals who are disabled and who are getting help through Vocational Rehabilitation, there is some grant money available. Be sure to ask your counselor about this program.
- The Community Development Block Grant program has a business grant program that is rarely accessed by Maine towns. Check with your local town to see if they have this program in place. CDBG loans are also a feature of these programs.
- If a family is receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), there is a small amount available (\$500) to help with business start-up expenses if starting a business is a part of the family's work plan and contract.
- Women, Work, and Community has a very, very small mini-grant program that is focused on marketing endeavors. Check with the Bath office (see above) to see about the schedule and process for applying for a mini-grant.
- From time to time, an organization may announce a grant program for small businesses. Keep your eyes open. Be very alert, however, for scams!

A local resource for financing is the Bowdoinham Community Development Initiative (BCDI). It is a non-profit Maine corporation designed to stimulate, grow and sustain healthy enterprises, create "resilient" jobs, and facilitate "smart growth" collaboration among the for-profit, non-profit, and government sectors in the local community.
